Amplifying Student Voice & Partnership

Student Voice participants share a deep belief that elevating the role of young people in their learning and in the school redesign process itself is essential to the future of education. To this end, they are ardent advocates of student voice and partnership in their respective and intersecting realms of youth activism, research, policy, teacher preparation, educational leadership, funding, and organizations working for educational transformation.

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Who is invited?

- STUDENTS taking a leadership role on state, national, or international levels to further the role of youth in learning and school decisionmaking.
- Field-based PRACTITIONERS with a mission to elevate youth voice and partnership in learning and school redesign efforts.
- Youth voice/youth-adult partnership **RESEARCHERS**.
- EDUCATIONAL LEADERS committed to integrating student voice into the teacher education process.
- POLICY ADVOCATES & FUNDERS
 with a mission to elevate youth adult partnership in school redesign
 efforts on a large scale.

Only when we build bridges among each of our unique stakeholder worlds will we be able to find the "sweet spot" that best informs and inspires our practices, fosters collaboration, and synergistically advances this movement. Advocacy work to amplify youth voice too often occurs in isolation. This fragmentation precludes tapping into the collective wisdom of others who are on a different route to the same destination.

Throughout the three days, we will have the opportunity to share stories as advocates for a fundamental culture shift in youth and adults partnering together for change:

- When have we been successful in furthering this culture shift?
- Where have we met obstacles?
- What practice-based and research-based work can help to support this work?
- What are the gaps and dilemmas that require further investigation and action?

This conference invites both youth and adult advocates in this partnership to examine their own roles and gain insight into the varied contributions of others. We will mobilize multiple perspectives to explore our dilemmas in a rich learning and sharing community. And we will seek common ground on which to further our collective vision through stronger networks and enhanced resources.

The seminar is designed to create multiple opportunities for deep conversation and collaboration, as well as presentations and keynotes by experts in related fields.
