Getting to "Y" (GTY) - Youth Taking the Lead as Change Agents in their Schools and Communities!

Over 180 middle and high school students from 10 different Vermont counties gathered in October to learn about Getting to 'Y': Youth Bring Meaning to their Youth Risk Behavior Survey. GTY invites middle and high school students to analyze their local Youth Risk Behavior Survey (YRBS) data and then lead multi-generational dialogue to help develop concrete action plans to improve the health and well-being of youth in their school and community. Over the course of the training days, high school and middle school teams worked with UP for Learning youth and adult facilitators to

Teams are now planning to facilitate their own data analysis retreats, where they will lead a group of peers through an exploration of their local YRBS data to identify strengths to celebrate and concerns to address. Later in the year they will host community dialogue events to foster awareness of their concerns, to facilitate dialogue about root causes, and to develop concrete action to improve their concern areas. Barre City Middle School Teachers Explore Metacognition

The Barre City Middle School faculty focused their second in-service professional development day with UP on building the metacognitive capacity of teachers and students. Utilizing resources from Harvard's Project Zero and Ron Ritchhart's principles for *Making Thinking Visible,* faculty explored the application of the *See-Think-Wonder* and *Connect-Extend-Challenge* thinking routines. They examined their own individual practice and worked as grade-level teams to initiate the incorporation of visible thinking routines into their pedagogy.

UP **for Learning** is grateful and honored to be working with youth/adult teams from 11 schools throughout Vermont to create a culture and climate within each school that infuses *Restorative Practice* into all parts of the learning community.

This work is aligned with our belief that youth can and should work in collaboration with adults to make learning more engaging.

So far this year, the youth and adult teams have met to develop a shared understanding of *Restorative Practices*. The teams will be meeting again on November 29th for a Circle Keeper Training with guest facilitator, Annie O'Shaughnessy (www.truenatureteaching.com).

As the year progresses, the school teams will conduct action research project specifically aligned to their school's needs.
