- Collect data from as many community members as possible *all* voices should be heard!
- Analyze this data and prioritize youth voice in the process.
- Envision the Portrait both the image and the pillars of 21st century education in your district.
- Share the process and the results with your community.
- Guide your district/SU leadership as it embeds the portrait in strategic planning and curricular developments at all grade levels.

Through this process, your district will develop a collective stance on what it means for ALL students to be college, career, and life ready.
